Bldg. 200 expansion under way

The aggressive pace at which GCC is upgrading its facilities continued July 19 with the groundbreaking for the renovation and expansion of Building 200, one of the four former “Butler” buildings on the east side of campus. The \$4.8 M project is being funded in part by a \$1.95 M hardening project grant from FEMA, with the GCC Board of Trustees’ Capital Projects fund providing the remainder. When finished in 2014, Building 200 will be a two-story, 22,600 square foot concrete home for the Education Department containing 10 classrooms/labs, a study room and an exercise room. Slated to be the campus’ third LEED-certified building, it will contain pv panels, a rainwater catchment system and other sustainable features.

Education, CJ articulate to UOG

Students majoring in criminal justice and education at GCC can now pursue their bachelor degrees at the University of Guam after they graduate. An articulation agreement between the two institutions formalized in June announced that students who earn their Associate of Science in Criminal Justice or their Associate of Arts in Education at GCC can transfer to UOG to pursue a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice or a Bachelor of Arts in Education, effective fall semester 2013.

Criminal Justice and Education are the second and third program-to-program articulation agreements formulated between GCC and UOG. Last fall, the GCC’s AA degree in IAS became the first degree to articulate over to UOG’s BA degree in Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences.

“It is a testament to the cooperative efforts of both our institutions that these agreements continue to be reached,” said Dr. Ray Somera, GCC Vice President for Academic Affairs. “This type of agreement provides more options for students and encourages them to further pursue their postsecondary education. It is advantageous for our students, our institutions, and our workforce.” Dr. Somera noted that several other program articulation agreements are in the works between the two institutions.

From the ALO's desk...

Dr. Ray Somera, VP for Academic Affairs

I did quite a lot of traveling this summer for GCC, to Kolonia, Yap and to Bangkok, Thailand. In Yap, I attended a week-long series of meetings to conduct a presentation entitled "Sustainability for Behavioral Health Workforce Development: A GCC-GBHWC Collaborative Model," and learned about industry certification for behavioral-health programs in anticipation of offering a Human Services degree program at GCC in the immediate future. Examples of courses that we will try to institutionalize into the curriculum include SafeTalk, ASIST, Mental Health Toolkit, among others.

The Pacific Behavioral Health Coordinating Council's discussions on strengthening the behavioral health workforce development for the region were very helpful. I also gained more comprehensive knowledge of substance abuse issues regarding prevention and treatment confronting each of the Pacific jurisdictions, and the role of the community college in resolving pertinent issues that involve higher education programs and processes, as well as sustaining training courses that can lead



to multiple career pathways for local students interested in the behavioral health fields.

Upon the invitation of the Dusit International executives based in Bangkok, Thailand, Dr. Okada and I, along with Tourism Chair Norman Aguilar, met with school officials of Dusit Thani College in Bangkok to explore possible areas of educational exchange and articulation that would enrich GCC's program offerings in Tourism and Hospitality, to include Culinary Arts, Food and Beverage, and Hotel Industry

Management, and to learn more about Dusit International operations, in anticipation of the opening of Dusit Thani Hotel – Guam which is expected to open on island in midyear 2014. We discussed the possibility of a faculty exchange, a student enrichment experience, and a 2 + 2 degree pathway, where students of GCC, after receiving their two-year Associate of Science, or Associate of Arts degree, can continue to spend two more years at DTC, where they will eventually earn their Bachelor's degree. As a result of our visit, a general Statement of Intent for Educational Exchange and Cooperation was signed by President Okada and Dusit Thani College Rector Veera Pardpattanpanich.

Plus, the food was delicious! So all in all, it was a very productive summer!



Procurement Training

GCC's CEWD Office started its four-module procurement training in July with "Fundamentals and Principles of Procurement." One of the course's more notable students was Sen. Tom Ada. The Solicitation Process module is scheduled for August, Procurement Review and Remedies for September, and Management and Administration of Procurement will run in October.

CACGP's Summer Bridge



GCC's CACGP program hosted two sessions of its Summer Bridge program from June 10 – July 19, providing a total of 120 students with career exploration activities, cultural and career field trips, and computer, math, English and science classes. Educational supplies, field trip fees, and breakfast & lunch were included.

Citi-GCC PSEAI

The Citi Foundation again teamed up with GCC to offer up to 20 high school graduates or incoming juniors or seniors the opportunity to prepare for college and possibly earn college credit at GCC. The PSEAI program ran from June 7 – July 19 and provided the selected seniors or graduates with English and math instruction, textbooks, tutors, financial aid counseling, college coping skills workshops, budgeting and career workshops conducted by Citi employee volunteers, placement tests and career interest inventories.



GCC-DPW Nat'l Summer Transportation Institute



GCC teamed up with the Dept. of Public Works and CACGP this summer for a National Summer Transportation Institute (NSTI) grant that allowed middle and high school students to explore careers in the transportation industry through field trips to transportation sites around the island and practical, hands-on activities using math skills needed to succeed in the industry. The two-week programs for each level ran from June 17-July 15.

Project AIM Summer Success

The Project AIM Summer Success program helped 20 students to prepare for college from June 17 – July 5. The program focused on preparing students for college level math, familiarizing them with the financial aid application process, and focusing on time and stress management, reading skills, career choices and setting goals.

JFK student scores WorkKeys Platinum!

Jordan Elizaga still has six more years of schooling before he earns his mechanical engineering degree, but according to the WorkKeys assessment administered by GCC, he's already at the skill level needed for that profession. Elizaga, a junior at John F. Kennedy High School, is the first high school student on Guam to score at the platinum level on the WorkKeys assessment. He is one of 54 JFK students who completed the assessment this school year.

Ten TANF clients received Certificates of Enrichment from GCC and DPHSS on July 31 at the Hyatt Regency Guam after completing the 180-hour Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) training at GCC to address the shortfalls in this critically needed area in the health industry. Students place 15th in international business game

Five GCC students who took part in an international business simulation game as part of their spring semester Economics 110 course ended up in 15th place overall, competing against 41,248 students that comprised 14,654 companies in 405 schools throughout 35 countries in the world. The members of the GCC company, "Fortis," are Marina Aguilar, Charisha Hualde, David Kim, Verlyne Macaraeg, and Cyaundra Shimizu. In their final week of the game, they ended up in a 15-way tie for second place, ranking 8th out of the 15. Nine companies tied for 1st place, ranking Fortis 15th over all in the top 100 companies.

"This is the second time we've integrated this business simulation game into our curriculum," said Fred Tupaz, GCC instructor. "The outcome really reflects the quality of students that attend GCC. Employers are looking for employees that can make key decisions, and this simulation covers the whole gamut of the management process. It allows our students to directly apply what they learn in the classroom in a business environment."




GCC hosts Indigenous Fellows Institute

GCC hosted 15 STEM faculty from two-year Tribal and Pacific Rim colleges and high schools, including those on Guam, for an Indigenous Fellows Institute June 3-7. "Natural Resource Management," was funded by the National Partnership for Environmental Technology Education's (PETE) NSF ATE grant Connecting Tribal and Pacific Rim Colleges to Improve Indigenous Environmental Technology Education. The week-long institute featured 18 presenters and include workshops on freshwater ecology, marine resources, watersheds and GIS/GPS methods that are aligned to the needs of Tribal and Pacific Rim Colleges, and that will strengthen STEM education in environmental programs.

Health Spotlight on Shingles: What you need to know

Shingles is a disease caused by a virus. It is also known as herpes zoster, zoster, or zona. Shingles is characterized by skin rash which is painful, blistery, and located in a limited area on one side of the body. Usually, the rash heals within 2-4 weeks, but scarring and skin discoloration from the rash can occur. Some individuals may experience residual pain for months or even years. A painful condition called post herpetic neuralgia, which is often difficult to manage, can happen to one in five patients.

Before the appearance of rash, nonspecific symptoms such as headache, malaise and fever occur and may lead to incorrect diagnosis. These are usually followed by sensations of burning pain, itching, tingling, pricking or numbness. Direct contact with an active rash of shingles may spread the virus to someone who lacks immunity to the virus possibly, leading to a chicken pox infection.

Shingles is caused by the same virus that causes chicken pox. After the chicken pox infection, the virus is not eliminated from the body. Instead, the virus after years of infection can get reactivated and cause another viral infection called shingles. This means that shingles occurs only to those individuals who have been ill previously with chicken pox. Shingles can occur at any age, but it usually affects those who are 50 years old and older, and those with impaired immune system caused by aging, medications, psychological stress, and other factors.

For treatment, antiviral drugs can reduce the severity and duration of shingles. Also, analgesics (over-the-counter and prescribed) may be used to relieve pain and discomfort. For prevention of shingles, a live vaccine marketed as Zostavax exists and is recommended for use in individuals 60 years old and older.

Know the facts and take the mystery out of shingles!
